Andrew M. Andrew's service at the Labor Department earned him the Secretary's Award for Exceptional Achievement. Prior to his service at the Department of Labor, he was counsel and later chief counsel to the U.S. Senate Committee on Rules and Administration for former Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell. During his service in the Senate, Andrew was appointed chief counsel of the Joint Congressional Committee on the 2001 Inaugural Ceremonies. Before moving to Washington, D.C., he served as a law clerk to the Honorable Danny J. Boggs of the U.S. Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals. Andrew frequently speaks on regulatory issues of interest to labor organizations and trade associations and teaches CLE courses regarding Rules of Professional Conduct and federal lobbying and ethics regulations. He has served as vice chair of the D.C. Bar's Continuing Legal Education (CLE) Committee. In 2019, Andrew received the D.C. Bar's Frederick B. Abramson Award for dedication and service to the legal profession. He graduated magna cum laude from the University of Texas at Austin and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.
